Data Release Timetable

By 2010, socio-economic and housing characteristics of the U.S. population that were available only once every 10 years through the census will be available annually through the American Community Survey (ACS).

Currently, single-year data are available annually for all areas with populations of 65,000 or more. It will take three to five years to accumulate a large enough sample to produce data for smaller areas, depending on the population size of the area (see chart below). Once that sample is collected, though, the Census Bureau will be able to release three- or five-year estimates every year for those areas. The larger areas will receive estimates in both the single- and multiyear formats.

Estimates are released in the summer following the calendar year in which the data were collected, according to the following schedule:

* Census tracts are small, relatively permanent statistical subdivisions of a county averaging about 4,000 inhabitants. Census block groups generally contain between 600 and 3,000 people. The smallest geographic level for which data will be produced is the block group; the Census Bureau will not publish estimates for small numbers of people if there is a probability that an individual can be identified.
