U.S. Office of Management and Budget Standards:


- **2 minimum categories for data on ethnicity**

Definition of Hispanic or Latino

A person of Cuban, Mexican, Puerto Rican, South or Central American, or other Spanish culture or origin regardless of race





Percent Hispanic of the U.S. Population: 1970 to 2050





U.S. Population Growth by Hispanic Origin: 2000 to 2011




Total Population Growth (30.2 million)

Growth of the Hispanic Population by Source: 2000 to 2010





Hispanic Origin by Age: 2011




Percent of Population Hispanic or Latino: 2011

(Hispanic or Latino population as a percent of total population by county)





U.S. Hispanic Population (in millions) by State: 2011



Percent Change in Hispanic Population by State: 2000 to 2011










Nativity and Citizenship: 2010




Educational Attainment: 2010
