ACS is a Large, Continuous Survey

- Samples about 3.5 million addresses/year
- Multiple modes of data collection
- Estimates of social, economic, demographic and housing characteristics
- Estimates for small areas and population groups
- New 1-year, 3-year, and 5-year estimates every year



ACS Estimates Are NOT the 2010 Census Population Counts

- 2010 Census counted the population to support apportionment and redistricting
- ACS surveys about 2% of the population to provide an annual portrait of community's characteristics
- ACS allows the decennial census to focus on providing the best count of the population



ACS Estimates are Period Estimates

- Describe the average characteristics over a specific period of time
 - 1 year (12 months)
 - 3 years (36 months)
 - 5 years (60 months)
- Do not represent a single point in time
- 5-year estimates are NOT an average of five 1-year estimates



5-Year Estimates Details

- Cover period from Jan. 1, 2006 to Dec. 31, 2010
- Geographic boundaries as of Jan. 1, 2010
- Dollar values inflation adjusted to 2010 dollars
- Over 11 billion characteristic estimates
- Nearly 700,000 unique geographic areas
- Estimates published regardless of margin of error



ACS Data Dissemination: 1-Year, 3-Year, and 5-Year Estimates

65,000 or more	1-year, 3-year, and 5-year
20,000 to 64,999	3-year, and 5-year
Less than 20,000	5-year

- Subset of the 1-Year and 3-Year Data Products
 - Fewer Detailed Tables
 - No Ranking Tables
 - No Comparison Profiles
 - No Selected Population Profiles
- Contains Fewer Topics
 - No Health Insurance Coverage (2008-2012)
 - No Disability Status (2008-2012)
 - No Marital History (2008-2012)
 - No Field of Bachelor's Degree (2009-2013)




5-Year Data Product Changes


- 10 New Detailed Tables:
 - 7 housing
 - 2 fertility
 - 1 place of birth
- 3 New Geographic Comparison Tables
- About 150 modified tables
 - Updates reflect 2010 Standard Occupational Classification
 - Universe descriptions changed to match 2010 Census
- 1 Deleted Geographic Comparison Table
- All tables, except block group tables, now available on AFF





Comparison Guidance

- Compare across geographies and population subgroups using 2006-2010 ACS
- Be careful comparing across data sets
 - Don't expect 2006-2010 ACS 5-year estimates to equal 2010 Census counts
 - Don't compare 2006-2010 ACS 5-year estimates to 2005-2009 ACS 5-year estimates
 - Do not mix 1-year, 3-year, and 5-year estimates when making comparisons



Geographic Comparison Tables (GCTs)

- GCTs assist in comparing across geographies
- 78 characteristics
- Allow for comparisons across
 - States
 - Counties
 - Places
 - Metropolitan and Micropolitan Statistical Areas
 - Combined Statistical Areas
 - Congressional Districts
 - Urban/Rural Areas
 - Urbanized Areas
 - PUMAs
 - School Districts
 - American Indian Areas/Alaska Native Areas/Hawaiian Homelands/Alaska Native Regional Corporations

Margins of Error

ACS publishes margins of error (MOEs) for most estimates

- Check MOEs to ensure estimates have sufficient reliability for their intended use
- Reliability can be improved by aggregating geographies or subpopulations


Highlights from the ACS 5-Year Briefs



Native North American Languages Spoken at Home in the United States

- 372,000 people speak a Native North American language
- 64% live in an American Indian or Alaska Native Area (AIANA)
- Navajo is the most common Native North American language with 169,000 speakers followed by Yupik and Dakota with approximately 19,000 speakers each
- 5.4% of people in AlaNAs spoke a Native North American language





Areas with Concentrated Poverty

- 13.8% of the population are in poverty (2006-2010 ACS)
- 50% of the poor live in Census tracts with poverty rates of 20% or more
- Proportion of the population living in Census tracts with poverty rates of 20% or more ranged from 5% in New Hampshire to 46% in Mississippi
- 55% of children live in tracts with poverty rates of 20% or more



Areas with Concentrated Poverty (cont.)

- Of those living in tracts with poverty rates of less than 13.8%
 - 81% White
 - 7% Black
 - 6% Asian
- Of those living in tracts with poverty rates of 40% or more
 - 43% White
 - 38% Black
 - 3% Asian



Areas with Concentrated Poverty (cont.)

Characteristic	Tracts with poverty rates less than 13.8%	Tracts with poverty rates of 40% or more
Percent with less than a high school diploma	10%	34%
Received Food Stamp/SNAP benefits	5%	31%
Female-householder families	14%	46%
Worked year-round, full-time	65%	47%

What it is:

 First set of annual estimates that use the 2010 Census as its benchmark
