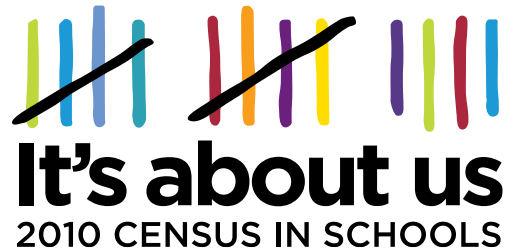


**THE 2010 CENSUS AMERICAN SAMOA IS COMING! Make sure you and your students are counted.**

**Work with teachers to create an exciting week of census fun. Consider these suggestions:**

- 1. Information Night:** Invite a member from your local Complete Count Committee to a parents' meeting.
- 2. PTA/PTO:** Send student ambassadors to answer questions about the census.
- 3. Census Countdown:** Integrate a census countdown into daily announcements.
- 4. School Census:** Conduct a schoolwide census that coincides with the national census.
- 5. Complete Counts Matter:** Remind students daily of one reason that the census matters to your community.

- Activity suggestions that empower students to educate the community about the 2010 Census American Samoa
