## PROJECTIONS OF THE POPULATION OF VOTING AGE, FOR STATES: NOVEMBER 1966 AND 1968

This report presents projections of the population of voting age for States for November 1966 and 1968, the dates of the next two general elections, and projections of the number of persons in each State reaching voting age since November 1964. Estimates of the population of voting age for earlier election years back to 1960 are also shown.

The population of voting age in November 1966 is expected to number 35.5 million persons in the South; corresponding figures for the other regions are: the North Central Region, 31.9 million; the Northeast, 29.6 million; and the West, 19.3 million. California and New York will exceed by far all other States in population of voting age, both States having an expected voting-age population in November 1966 of about 11½ million.

Nationally, about 116.4 million persons living in the United States will be old enough to vote in the general election of November 1966. This figure is expected to increase to about 120.0 million by November 1968. In the last general election (November 1964) about 113.8 million persons were old enough to vote.

The population reaching voting age since November 1964 is expected to be 5.5 million by 1966 and 12.4 million by 1968. Both

California and New York are expected to have more than 1 million persons who will be old enough to vote for president for the first time in the 1968 elections (table 1).

In all but four States, the population of voting age includes all persons 21 years old and over. The figures include persons 18 years old and over in Georgia and Kentucky; 19 years old and over in Alaska; and 20 years old and over in Hawaii.

In the 1964 presidential election, voter participation was highest in Utah, where nearly 79 percent of the adult population went to the polls, and lowest in Mississippi, where only 33 percent cast ballots. In 41 States. somewhat more than half of the population of voting age voted in 1964 (figure 1). /The South, as a whole, showed the lowest voter participation among the four regions of the country; 48 percent of the population of voting age voted in the South, as compared with 67 percent in the Northeast, 70 percent in the North Central Region, and 66 percent in the The total number of votes cast for president for the Nation as a whole in November 1964 was 70.7 million, or 62 percent of the total resident population of voting age2 (63 percent of the civilian population of



roting age). The proportion of the resident population voting for U.S. Representatives in 1964 was 58 percent. In 1962, a nonpresidential election year, the participation rate was 46 percent.

The population of voting age includes a considerable number of persons who, although old enough to vote, cannot do so. Only citizens are eligible to vote. An estimated 3.5 million aliens were registered in January 1966 under the requirements of the Immigration and Naturalization Act. The majority of these are usual residents of the United States and are of voting age. Among citizens of voting age. some persons are not permitted to vote because they have been committed to penal institutions. mental hospitals, or other institutions; still other would-be voters are unable to vote because they do not meet State requirements as to length of residence. Eligibility to vote is governed by State laws which differ in many respects. The literacy test and poll tax, which were administered by a minority of the States, are no longer requirements for voting either in State and local elections or in Federal elections.3

There is a substantial number of persons of voting age in the District of Columbia, which does not elect a Representative. (In the 1964 election, for the first time, the District of Columbia voted in the presidential election.) In addition to those persons not meeting the registration requirements, the District has a large number of persons who meet the residence requirements of other States and therefore may choose to cast their ballots in those States.

### METHODOLOGY

The estimates of the voting-age population for 1960 to 1964 were based on estimates of the population of States, by age, for July 1, 1964 and 1965, published in report No. 333 of this series, and on revised

<sup>3</sup> Literacy tests were suspended under the 1965 Voting Rights Act in those States or political subdivisions of States where less than half of the voting-age population had registered to vote or voted in the 1964 election. Consequently, such tests are no longer applicable in States of Alabama, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, and South Carolina, and selected counties of other States, notably North Carolina. (Alaska was removed from the scope of the Act by declaratory judgment of the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia.)

In 1966, the Supreme Court of the United States found use of the poll tax as a prerequisite for voting in State and local elections to be unconstitutional. Up to that time, four States, Alabama, Mississippi, Virginia, and Texas, had such taxes. State poll taxes as a requirement for voting in Federal elections were banned by a Constitutional Amendment in 1964.

estimates, by age, for earlier years, to be published later this year. These estimates, in turn, were developed by carrying forward the 1960 Census data, by age, for each State, allowing for births, deaths, net civilian international and interstate migration, net movement of civilians into the Armed Forces between April 1, 1960, and the estimate date, and the number of Armed Forces stationed in each State on the estimate date.

The projections of the population of voting age for November 1966 are, essentially, extrapolations by age cohort of the components of change (deaths and interstate migration) of the estimates by broad age groups of the 1960-65 period indicated above. The votingage population for November 1968 is based on the November 1966 figures, plus projections of net change for this age group for November 1966 to 1968, implied in the report on projections of the population of States, published earlier this year (Series P-25, No. 326).

The procedures used to develop the projections of the voting-age population for 1966 and 1968 given here are substantially simpler than those used to prepare the regular current population estimates. The figures are designed primarily to provide gross patterns and levels of the voting-age population and of "new voters." Small differences between figures as well as small changes over time should be interpreted cautiously.

#### RELATED REPORTS

The estimates and projections of the voting-age population are consistent with estimates of the population of States for 1964 and 1965 published in Series P-25, No. 333, and with the national population of voting age published in Series P-25, Nos. 325 and 315. Figures on the population of voting age and the percent casting votes, for counties, for 1960 are given in Current Population Reports, Series P-23, No. 14. The data for States in the latter report differ slightly from the corresponding State figures in this report because of revised national totals.

#### ROUNDING OF ESTIMATES

The estimates presented in the tables of this report have been rounded to the nearest thousand without being adjusted to group totals which are independently rounded. The percentages are based on unrounded numbers.
