Population Characteristics

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FALL SCHOOL ENROLLMENT APPROXIMATELY 58.8 MILLION

(Advance data, October 1968 survey)

About 58.8 million persons 3 to 34 years old were enrolled in school or college in the United States in the fall of 1968, according to the results of the Current Population Survey conducted in October 1968 by the Bureau of the Census.

There were 4.1 million enrolled below the elementary school level (3.3 million in kindergarten and 800,000 in nursery school), 33.8 million enrolled in elementary school, 14.1 million in high school, and 6.8 million in college.

Compared with October 1964, total school enrollment had increased by 6.3 million, or 12 percent, nursery school enrollment had increased by 73 percent, kindergarten enrollment by 15 percent, elementary school enrollment by 6 percent, high school enrollment by 10 percent, and college enrollment by 46 percent.

The increased enrollment in nursery school and kindergarten was due primarily to increases in the percent enrolled among children 3 to 5 years old rather than to increases in the total population of

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these ages. The increased enrollment in college was due to increases in the percent enrolled among persons in the age group 18 to 34 and to increases in the total population of these ages, with the increase in the enrollment rate being the more important. The increased enrollment in elementary and secondary schools was due primarily to increases in the population 6 to 17 years old rather than to changes in the percent of persons enrolled.

In October 1968, 13 percent of the children enrolled in grades 1 to 8 were in private schools, and 10 percent of those in grades 9 to 12 were in private schools. The number of students enrolled in private elementary schools decreased from 4.9 million in 1964 to 4.2 million in 1968—a decline of 14 percent.

Enrollment statistics shown in this report refer to the civilian noninstitutional population reported as enrolled in regular public and private schools and colleges by the middle of October, when the Current Population Survey was conducted. The statistics include both full-time and part-time students and persons who were working in addition to attending school. Children enrolled in "Head Start" programs

or similar programs sponsored by local agencies to provide preschool education to young children are counted as enrolled in nursery school or kindergarten as appropriate. These figures may differ from figures on school enrollment reported by other sources, largely because (1) the Bureau of the Census collects data by household interviews, whereas information from other sources is generally based on reports from school systems and institutions of higher learning; and (2) there are often differences in definitions and time Also, enrollment as of October, will references. usually be lower than enrollment for the whole school vear because the latter provides a cumulative count of persons who enter school at different times throughout the vear.

Since the figures presented in this report are based on sample data, they may differ from the figures that would have been obtained from a complete census. The sampling variation may be relatively large where the numbers shown are small. A more complete statement on the variability due to sampling, as well as more detailed information about the fall enrollment figures, will be issued in a later report in this series.
