

# Support Providers: 2013

## Current Population Reports

The financial support paid to people living outside the household can be an important source of income for the millions of people who receive that support. Likewise, the support paid to other people can represent a sizable proportion of the provider's income and wealth. Many of the financial payments occur as a result of legal obligations to support the providers' children or ex-spouses in the form of child support and alimony, while other payments are to parents, adult children, other relatives, and nonrelatives. This report uses data from the 2014 panel of the Survey of Income and Program Participation (SIPP), a national longitudinal survey conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, to look at the monetary support paid to people living outside the household for the 2013 calendar year.<sup>1</sup>

### HIGHLIGHTS

- A total of 14.9 million people provided financial support to people living outside their household in 2013, totaling \$98.4 billion.
- About 5.8 million parents, 90.6 percent of whom were fathers, provided \$35.3 billion in child support on behalf of their children under 21 years old in 2013.
- Over half (55.3 percent) of parents paid support for one child, while 14.0 percent paid child support for three or more children.

- Child support providers paid an average amount of \$6,069 per year, or \$506 per month.

### WHO IS A SUPPORT PROVIDER?

In the 2014 SIPP, eligible respondents were asked if they had any children under 21 years old who lived elsewhere with their other parent or guardian at any time during 2013. If the respondent answered "Yes," they were asked if they made any payments for the support of this child(ren). Those who responded that they made payments are considered child support providers.

Separately, all eligible respondents were asked if they made support payments in 2013 to other people living outside their household—either to parents, children 21 years and older (not away at school), someone else related to them, ex-spouses or ex-partners, or someone else not related to them. Those who responded that they had made payments are considered other support providers.

Note: The financial support paid to people outside the household as measured in SIPP was provided directly to or on behalf of other people, regardless of where they lived. Support payments may have been to people in another household, to people residing in institutional or noninstitutional places, or to those living in countries outside the United States. Specifically, in the case of child support paid, some payments may have been made directly to the state child support enforcement agency for support of their children, and may or may not have been passed through to the recipient if the recipient participated in the public assistance Temporary Assistance to Needy Families program, dependent on state policy.

- Average amounts of support provided in 2013 was highest for those paying ex-spouses or ex-partners (\$9,958).

## ALL SUPPORT PROVIDERS

A total of 14.9 million people provided financial support to people living outside their household in 2013. This included a total of 17.3 million payments for either child support on behalf of children under 21 years old (5.8 million), to parents (4.4 million), to adult children (2.6 million), to other relatives (2.2 million), to ex-spouses or ex-partners (1.8 million), or to other nonrelatives (0.5 million) (Tables 1–6).<sup>2</sup>


About \$35.3 billion was provided in child support on behalf of children under 21 years old, \$12.7 billion was provided to parents, \$19.6 billion to adult children, \$18.3 billion to ex-spouses or ex-partners, \$10.6 billion to other relatives, and \$1.9 billion to other nonrelatives (Figure 1).<sup>3</sup>

An aggregate total of \$98.4 billion was paid in support for people living outside the household in 2013. While government programs are often thought of as one of the most important sources of support, total support from individuals outside the household is greater than some of the largest

government assistance programs.

For example, as reported in the SIPP for 2013, wave 1, total support from the Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP) was \$50.9 billion; total Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) benefits were \$4.3 billion; and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits totaled \$49.3 billion (Figure 2).<sup>4</sup>

## CHILD SUPPORT PROVIDERS

In 2013, about 5.8 million parents paid child support on behalf of their children under 21 years old who lived outside of their household. About 9 in 10 of child support payers were fathers (90.6 percent) and 1 in 10 were mothers (9.4 percent). Over half (55.3 percent) provided support for one child, 30.7 percent supported two children, and 14.0 percent provided support for three or more children (Table 1).

The average annual amount of child support paid in 2013 was \$6,069, or about \$506 per month. Taken together, the aggregate annual amount of child support paid by the 5.8 million

parents totaled \$35.3 billion in 2013. Fathers paid an average of \$6,312 or 10.7 percent of their average annual family income, while mothers paid an average of \$3,723 or 7.4 percent of their average annual family income. The median amount of child support paid in 2013 was \$4,711, meaning half of providers paid less than this amount and half paid more. Fathers paid a median of \$4,765 in child support in 2013 and mothers paid a median of \$2,385. Mothers who paid child support tended to be much more likely to have their 2013 family incomes at or below

the poverty level (29.4 percent) than fathers (10.7 percent).<sup>5</sup>

About 14.9 percent of fathers who paid child support for their children under 21 living elsewhere didn't spend any time with their youngest (or only) child. For women paying child support, a larger proportion, 26.8 percent

didn't spend any time with their youngest child in 2013.

## OTHER SUPPORT PROVIDERS

About 4.4 million people provided financial support to their parents who lived outside their household in 2013. The mean annual amount of support paid to parents was \$2,888, totaling to an aggregate of \$12.7 billion. This accounted for, on average, 3.3 percent of the providers' mean family income in 2013 (Table 2).

Approximately 2.6 million people provided financial support to their children aged 21 and older who lived outside their household in 2013. The mean annual amount of support provided was \$7,563, amounting to an aggregate total of \$19.6 billion in support paid. On average, this accounted for 7.4 percent of the mean family income for those who provided support to their adult children living outside their household in 2013 (Table 3).

About 2.2 million people provided financial support to other people related to them, besides children and parents, who lived outside of their household in 2013. The mean annual amount of support paid to these other relatives was \$4,906, amounting to \$10.6 billion. This average amount represented approximately 5.8 percent of their mean family income in 2013. About 68.9 percent of providers supported just one relative, 16.3 percent made financial support payments to two relatives, and 14.9 percent to three or more other relatives (Table 4).<sup>6</sup>

A total of 1.8 million people provided financial support to their ex-spouses or ex-partners in 2013, often in the form of alimony or spousal support. The mean support provided was \$9,958, creating a total aggregate of \$18.3 billion in payments to ex-spouses or ex-partners. The median annual support provided was \$5,154. The vast majority of support providers to ex-spouses or ex-partners (93.4 percent) were male, where the average amount paid represented 12.3 percent of their mean family income in 2013. About 5.6 percent of all payers made support payments to two or more ex-spouses or ex-partners (Table 5).

Approximately 0.5 million people provided financial support to other nonrelatives who lived outside of their household. The mean amount paid (\$3,496) produced an aggregate of \$1.9 billion in support paid to nonrelatives, and on average represented 4.6 percent of their mean family income in 2013. Most providers (61.8 percent) supported just one nonrelative, 17.4 percent supported two, and 20.9 percent made financial support payments to three or more nonrelatives in 2013 (Table 6).<sup>7</sup>

## WHAT IS SIPP?

The Survey of Income and Program Participation (SIPP) is a nationally representative panel survey administered by the Census Bureau that collects information on the short-term dynamics of employment, income, household composition, and eligibility and participation in government assistance programs. It is a leading source of information on specific topics related to economic well-being, family dynamics, education, wealth and assets, health insurance, child care, and food security. Each SIPP panel follows individuals for several years, providing monthly data that measure changes in household and family composition and economic circumstances over time. ## OTHER CENSUS BUREAU SOURCES OF SUPPORT PAID AND RECEIVED

The Census Bureau also collects information about child support paid as well as child support received in the Current Population Survey (CPS). Detailed information about child support agreements and awards, custody and visitation, health care provisions, cash and noncash support received are collected in the April CPS—Child Support Supplement (CSS). The CPS Annual Social and Economic Supplement (ASEC) collects information about child support and alimony received as income sources, as well as child support paid.

For other support providers, SIPP is the only Census Bureau survey that asks detailed questions about relationships indicating to whom and how much private support is provided to people outside the household.

<sup>1</sup>Federal surveys now give respondents the option of reporting more than one race. Therefore, two basic ways of defining a race group are possible. A group, such as Black, may be defined as those who reported Black and no other race (the race-alone or the single-race concept) or as those who reported Black, regardless of whether they also reported another race (the race-alone-or-in-combination concept). Hispanics may be any race. The body of this report (text, figures, and tables) shows data for people who reported they were a single race. Use of the single-race concept does not imply that it is the preferred method of presenting or analyzing data. The U.S. Census Bureau uses a variety of approaches. In this report, the term "non-Hispanic White" refers to people who are not Hispanic and reported White and no other race. "Non-Hispanic Black" refers to people who are not Hispanic and reported Black and no other race. "Non-Hispanic Other" refers to people who are not Hispanic and reported Asian alone, Pacific Islander alone, American Indian alone, Alaskan Native alone, or multiple races.
