 - The Decennial Census the once-a-decade population and housing count of all 50 states and U.S. territories
 - The American Community Survey the ongoing, annual survey of the social, economic, housing, and demographic characteristics of the nation's population
 - The Economic Census the official five-year measure of American businesses
 - The Census of Governments identifies the scope and nature of the nation's state and local government sector
- Our mission is to serve as the nation's leading provider of quality data about its people and economy.






The American Community Survey The Foundation

The American Community Survey is on the leading edge of survey design, continuous improvement, and data quality

- The nation's most current, reliable, and accessible data source for local statistics on critical planning topics such as age, children, veterans, commuting, education, income, and employment
- Surveys **3.5 million** addresses and helps inform the distribution of hundreds of billions in federal funds each year
- Covers **40+ topics**, supports over **300** evidence-based federal government uses
- Three key annual data releases:
 - 1-year Estimates (for large populations, geographies of 65,000+ population)
 - 1-year Supplemental Estimates (for small populations, geographies of 20,000+ population)
 - 5-year Estimates (for very small populations, geographies down to Census Tracts and Block Groups)



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


The American Community Survey Federal Guidelines for Reporting on the AIAN Population

Office of Management and Budget (OMB) defines American Indian or Alaska Native for statistical purposes: "person having origins in any of the original peoples of North and South America (including Central America) who maintains tribal affiliation or community attachment."

Includes people who:

- indicate their race as "American Indian or Alaska Native", or
- report the name of their enrolled or principal tribe, or
- report the name of their Indian group.






The American Community Survey Data Collection Process

ACS data are collected continuously throughout the year:

- 12 monthly independent samples per year
- 3-modes over a 3-month period: Internet, Mail, and Personal Visit (CAPI)





The American Community Survey Additional AIAN Data Collection Procedures

AIAN Areas:

- Increase overall sample size & reallocate for more quality across small geographic areas
- Emphasis on personal visits for unmailable AIAN areas
- Attempt personal visits for all non-response cases in AIAN areas
- 2021 Internet response became an option

Remote Alaska Areas:

- 2 samples/year collected over 6-month period via personal visit
- 2021 Internet response became an option





The American Community Survey AIAN Sampling

Procedures to increase sample sizes in AIAN and Hawaiian Home Land areas:

- ACS samples housing units in less populous areas at higher rates (as high as 15% annually, or 75% over five years.)
- Full CAPI follow-up:
 - All Hawaiian Home Lands
 - All Alaska Native Village Statistical Areas
 - All American Indian Areas (10%+ of population responding to 2010 Census as AIAN race)



The American Community Survey ACS Field Work

- U.S. Census Bureau's American Indian and Alaska Native Policy Statement: Pledges to consult with tribal leaders and cooperate with them on any activities regarding the census or surveys that might affect their tribes. Since each nation forms its own government, the Census Bureau works with them one by one to respect each tribe's own customs, beliefs, and cultural norms.
- Visit to the reservation: Regional office staff contacts the tribal government and establishes a contact person for the initial visit and subsequent visits. In most circumstances, the contact person is part of the tribal leadership or a designated tribal liaison. Field representatives follow set procedures when conducting interviews in AIAN areas.

Census Bureau Regional Office Boundaries





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
The American Community Survey Census Bureau's Intergovernmental Affairs Office (IAO)

The IAO Tribal Affairs team works closely with AIAN tribal nations on a nation-tonation basis on behalf of the Census Bureau and its program areas.

- **Liaison:** Develop and maintain relationships and communication channels with tribal officials and the associations that serve them.
- **Policy Support:** Technical support in anticipation the adoption of public statements or official policy regarding agency programs or policies.
- Education: Ongoing effort to educate regarding Census Bureau programs and policies of interest to the associations and their membership.
- Advisory: Advice given to the Director and executive staff regarding responding to state, local, and tribal officials and their associations through formal and informal channels.




