

Small Area Health Insurance Estimates (SAHIE) from the U.S. Census Bureau

Health Insurance Coverage at the County and State Levels

The U.S. Census Bureau's Small Area Health Insurance Estimates (SAHIE) program is the only source of single-year estimates of health insurance coverage status for all counties in the United States by selected economic and demographic characteristics. Through modeling and using auxiliary data sources, the SAHIE program enhances survey estimates, reducing margins of error, especially for areas with small populations.

Data Sources for SAHIE:

- American Community Survey (ACS)
- Medicaid and Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) records
- Population estimates
- Federal income tax returns
- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) records
- County Business Patterns (CBP)
- 2020 Census

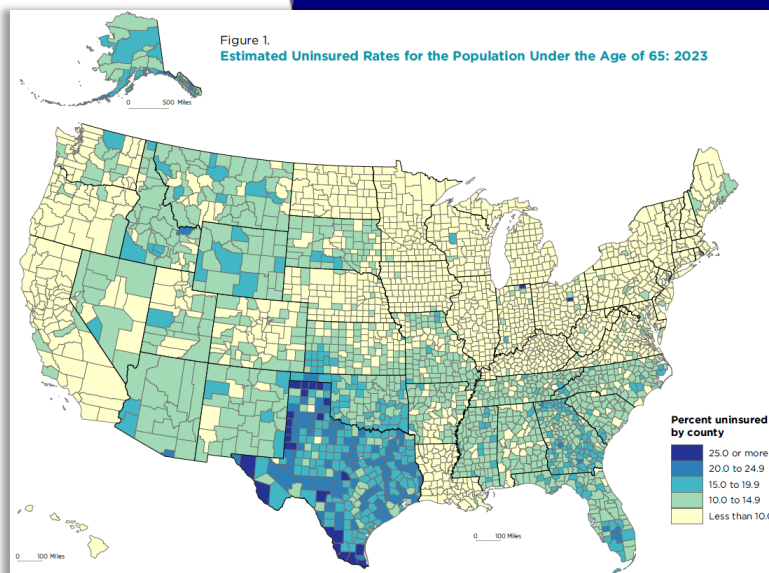
State and county estimates of people with and without health insurance coverage are available for:

- Ages 0-18, 0-64, 18-64, 21-64, 40-64, and 50-64
- Female, male, and both sexes
- All incomes and income-to-poverty ratios (IPR) less than or equal to 138, 200, 250, or 400 percent of the poverty threshold; also, IPR between 138 and 400 percent
- All races, White alone, Black or African American alone, American Indian and Alaska Native alone, Asian alone, Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander alone, Two or More Races alone, and Hispanic (states only)
- Measures of uncertainty of the estimates

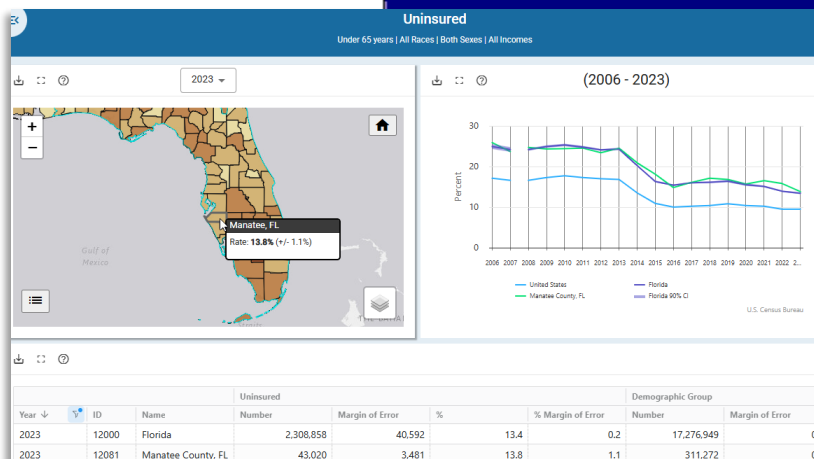
