# Coverage of Children in Administrative Records and the 2010 Census

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#### **Research Questions**

- How does coverage of 2010 Census data by administrative records vary by age group?
- How does Medicaid and Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) data improve coverage by age group?
- Do Medicaid and SNAP data contribute additional records to improve coverage of different demographic groups and response modes?



#### **Previous Research**

- The Census Bureau is investigating the strategic reuse of administrative records
- Counts of children in administrative records lower than in Census 2000 (Farber and Leggieri, 2002)
- Coverage rates of the 2010 Census and the 2010
   American Community Survey by administrative records is lowest for children (Rastogi and O'Hara, 2012; Luque and Bhaskar, 2014)



#### **Data**

- Person-Place Administrative Records Composite (PPARC)
- 2010 Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services
   Medicaid Statistical Information System
- 2010 New York State Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Participation (NY SNAP)
- 2010 Census



#### **PPARC Data Sources**

- Internal Revenue Service
- Department of Housing and Urban Development
- Social Security Administration
- Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services
- Selective Service System
- Indian Health Service patient registration system from the Department of Health and Human Services
- National Change of Address
- Temporary Assistance for Needy Families
- Third Party data





### Methodology


- Merge PPARC, Medicaid, and NY SNAP to 2010 Census using Protected Identification Keys (PIK)
- PIKs assigned by the Person Identification Validation System (PVS)
- PIKs uniquely identify person-records
- Coverage rate calculated as

Administrative Records  $\cap$  2010 Census 2010 Census





#### **Coverage of Medicaid and PPARC**







## **Summary of Findings**

- Coverage by PPARC is generally high across all age groups, but lowest for children
- Medicaid improves coverage of children in the 2010 Census
- NY SNAP also improves coverage of children in the 2010 Census (restricted to New York State)

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### **Findings**

- Coverage by PPARC is generally high across all age groups, but lowest for children
- Medicaid improves coverage of children in the 2010 Census
- NY SNAP also improves coverage of children in the 2010 Census (restricted to New York State)
- Medicaid substantially improves coverage of children who are Some Other Race alone, Hispanic, and living in Group Quarters
- NY SNAP substantially improves coverage of children who are AIAN alone,
   NHPI alone, Some Other Race Alone, Hispanic, and living in group quarters
- Medicaid and NY SNAP substantially improve coverage of Nonresponse
   Follow-Up for the 0-4 age group
- NY SNAP results for person-address pairs exhibit similar patterns
