Willard C. Smith, 61, Hospital Service Agency Chief, Dies

Willard C. Smith, 61, administrator of the Hospital Service Agency, died yesterday in Doctors Hospital. He was stricken last Wednesday while attending a Rotary Club luncheon at the Mayflower Hotel.

Mr. Smith, who lived at 3020 Tilden street N.W., joined the Hospital Service Agency in 1935 as a member of the board of directors. In 1940 he was appointed administrator of the agency which disperses hospitalization funds for the Community Chests of Alexandria, Fairfax and Prince Georges Counties as well as the United Community Services in the District.

Helped Organize Chest.

Prominent in social, welfare and health activities in the Washington area, Mr. Smith served as president of the Council of Social Agencies, predecessor of the UCS. He was a member of the citizens' committee that organized the first Community Chest over 20 years ago.

A native of Winchester, Ill., Mr. Smith was educated at the Illinois State Teachers College and the University of Chicago and received his master's degree from George Washington University.

After serving in Europe as an Army ambulance driver during World War I, he journeyed through western Russia and the Baltic states with the Red Cross, working with White Russian armies. At that time he was decorated with the Russian Order of St. Stanislas II.

Following his Red Cross service, Mr. Smith joined the United States Public Health Service's venereal disease control program. He left that department to work for the Census Bureau.

Was Pianist and Organist.

Mr. Smith, a talented pianist and organist, was a member of the Masons, the Kenwood Club, Washington Rotary Club, Board of Trade and a life member of the American Public Health Association.

Owner of the Millgate Farm in Fauquier County, Mr. Smith was well known in northern Virginia for his interest in horses and farming.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Maybelle Rucker Smith.

Funeral services will be held at noon Tuesday at the Hines funeral home, 2901 Fourteenth street N.W. Graveside services and burial will be held in Arlington Cemetery.
