## MONTHLY FULL REPORT ON MANUFACTURERS' SHIPMENTS, INVENTORIES AND ORDERS DECEMBER 2020

## Summary

New orders for manufactured goods in December, up eight consecutive months, increased $\$ 5.2$ billion or 1.1 percent to $\$ 493.5$ billion, the U.S. Census Bureau reported today. This followed a 1.3 percent November increase. Shipments, also up eight consecutive months, increased \$8.4 billion or 1.7 percent to $\$ 501.8$ billion. This followed a 0.8 percent November increase. Unfilled orders, down nine of the last ten months, decreased $\$ 3.0$ billion or 0.3 percent to $\$ 1,070.8$ billion. This followed a virtually unchanged November decrease. The unfilled orders-to-shipments ratio was 6.28, down from 6.40 in November. Inventories, up four of the last five months, increased $\$ 2.1$ billion or 0.3 percent to $\$ 695.7$ billion. This followed a 0.8 percent November increase. The inventories-to-shipments ratio was 1.39 , down from 1.41 in November.

## New Orders

New orders for manufactured durable goods in December, up eight consecutive months, increased \$1.2 billion or 0.5 percent to $\$ 246.4$ billion, up from the previously published 0.2 percent increase. This followed a 1.3 percent November increase. Machinery, also up eight consecutive months, led the increase, $\$ 0.9$ billion or 2.7 percent to $\$ 33.4$ billion. New orders for manufactured nondurable goods increased $\$ 4.1$ billion or 1.7 percent to $\$ 247.1$ billion.

## Shipments

Shipments of manufactured durable goods in December, up seven of the last eight months, increased \$4.3 billion or 1.7 percent to $\$ 254.7$ billion, up from the previously published 1.4 percent increase. This followed a 0.4 percent November increase. Transportation equipment, also up seven of the last eight months, led the increase, $\$ 2.5$ billion or 3.1 percent to $\$ 85.1$ billion. Shipments of manufactured nondurable goods, up eight consecutive months, increased $\$ 4.1$ billion or 1.7 percent to $\$ 247.1$ billion. This followed a 1.2 percent November increase. Petroleum and coal products, up seven of the last eight months, led the increase, $\$ 2.3$ billion or 5.6 percent to $\$ 44.2$ billion.

## Unfilled Orders

Unfilled orders for manufactured durable goods in December, down nine of the last ten months, decreased $\$ 3.0$ billion or 0.3 percent to $\$ 1,070.8$ billion, unchanged from the previously published decrease. This followed a virtually unchanged November decrease. Transportation equipment, down ten consecutive months, drove the decrease, $\$ 6.8$ billion or 1.0 percent to $\$ 706.3$ billion.

## Inventories

Inventories of manufactured durable goods in December, down following three consecutive monthly increases, decreased $\$ 1.0$ billion or 0.2 percent to $\$ 425.6$ billion, unchanged from the previously published decrease. This followed a 0.9 percent November increase. Transportation equipment, down following four consecutive monthly increases, drove the decrease, $\$ 2.8$ billion or 1.9 percent to $\$ 147.9$ billion. Inventories of manufactured nondurable goods, up four of the last five months, increased $\$ 3.1$ billion or 1.1 percent to $\$ 270.2$ billion. This followed a 0.7 percent November increase. Petroleum and coal products, up two consecutive months, led the increase, $\$ 1.4$ billion or 4.3 percent to $\$ 32.9$ billion. By stage of fabrication, December materials and supplies increased 0.5 percent in durable goods and 1.4 percent in nondurable goods. Work in process decreased 0.2 percent in durable goods and increased 1.1 percent in nondurable goods. Finished goods decreased 1.2 percent in durable goods and increased 0.9 percent in nondurable goods.

## EXPLANATORY NOTES

Figures in text are adjusted for seasonality, but not for inflation. Figures on new and unfilled orders exclude data for semiconductor manufacturing.
"Virtually unchanged" indicates that the change is less than 0.05 percent for a percent increase or decrease.

## Description of the survey

This report is compiled from results of the U.S. Census Bureau's Manufacturers' Shipments, Inventories, and Orders (M3) survey, which is a voluntary survey authorized by Title 13 of the United States Code. This survey provides statistics on a calendar-month basis for manufacturers' value of shipments, new orders (net of cancellations), end-of-month order backlog (unfilled orders), end-ofmonth total inventory (at current cost or market value), and inventories by stage of fabrication (materials and supplies, work-in-process, and finished goods). Data published from the M3 survey are based on a panel of approximately 5,000 reporting units that represent approximately 3,100 companies and provide an indication of month-to-month change for the Manufacturing Sector. These reporting units may be divisions of diversified large companies, large homogenous companies, or single-unit manufacturers in 92 industry categories, which are combined into 65 publication levels due to the small monthly panel size. The survey methodology assumes that the month-to-month changes of the total operations of the reporting units in the M3 panel effectively represent the month-tomonth movements of all establishments that make up the category. The companies for which shipments data are currently reported or imputed in the M3 survey represent approximately 60 percent of the total value of shipments for manufacturing establishments in the 2017 Economic Census, and these companies include roughly 61 percent of the manufacturing companies with $\$ 500$ million or more in shipments in the 2017 Economic Census. The companies for which shipments data are currently reported in the M3 survey represent approximately 51 percent of the total value of shipments for manufacturing establishments in the 2017 Economic Census. Statistics based on the M3 panel differ from the results that would be obtained from a complete enumeration of all manufacturing companies. The M3 panel is not based on a probability sample; therefore, the sampling

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errors that are normally provided with sample surveys cannot be measured. Nonsampling errors are attributable to many sources. The use of company or divisional reports to estimate the monthly change for establishments is one source of nonsampling error. The use of primarily large companies to represent the month-to-month movement of all companies is another potential source. Any corrections will be published in the full report. Corrections received after the full report will be released in the next month's advance report. Any revisions made later than two months will be reflected in the annual benchmark publication. ## Benchmark notice

Revised historical data from the Manufacturers' Shipments, Inventories, and Orders (M3) Survey will be issued on May 14, 2021. These revisions result from

- benchmarking the M3 shipments and inventories data to the 2019 and 2018 Annual Survey of Manufactures (ASM) data, as well as to revised ASM data from 2013 through 2016, resulting from benchmarking the ASM to the 2017 Economic Census;
- incorporating the unfilled orders to shipments ratios obtained for 2019 and 2018 from the Manufacturers' Unfilled Orders (M3UFO) Survey by applying these ratios to the respective ASM shipments data, as well as incorporating revised unfilled orders to shipments ratios for prior years;
- adjusting the new orders data to be consistent with the benchmarked shipments and unfilled orders data;
- correcting monthly data for late receipts, reclassifications of reported data, and revisions to previously reported data;
- updating the seasonally adjusted data based on the results of benchmarking and the recent annual review of the seasonal adjustment models.
These revisions will span the seasonally adjusted data for January 2007 through March 2021 and the data not seasonally adjusted for January 2012 through March 2021. An updated Press Release will contain revised monthly tables for January 2021 through March 2021.
